ECWC 12: Dealing with Goal, Motivation, and Conflict in Your Own Life: Optimizing the Writing Process while Keeping Motivation High

Paranormal romance author Rebecca Zanetti has published five books and one novella the last two years with Kensington Brava. Her current deadlines require her to turn in a book every three months. Nonfiction author Åsa Maria Bradley went from taking four years to complete her first manuscript to now finishing two per year. Both writers work full time as college professors, while still making time for writing, family, and sleep. In this workshop, they'll talk about:

- ❖ Making a schedule that fits you, instead of fitting yourself around a schedule.
- Protecting your writing time, without feeling guilty.
- Spending five minutes preparing for your writing session can double or triple your word count.
- Keeping writing at the forefront of your life, even when you're not in front of the keyboard.
- Nourishing your writing soul and keeping your creativity and motivation high, even while meeting your deadlines.
- ❖ Fun and effective mind games to get you back into your book.
- Where and how to search for inspiration...and yes, going after it with a club is perfectly acceptable.
- Connecting with critique partners and beta readers that fit your process and goals.
- Working with agents and editors to keep on track.
